Methodology

Grove Insight conducted a telephone survey of 400 voters

Interviews were conducted November 15-17, 2010.

The margin of error for the sample as a whole is plus or minus 4.9 percentage points at the 95% level of confidence. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher.

Throughout this report, we refer to "younger" and "older" voters. Younger voters are those under 50 and older voters are those age 50 and older.

Regionally, the state is divided several ways:


- By Media Market;

Three Quarters Feel That Way "Strongly"



More Than Three-Quarters of <u>Every</u> Major Subgroup Supports Expanding the Bottle Bill to Noncarbonated Beverages
