### VPIRG's 2015-2016 Legislative Scorecard

VPIRG produces a scorecard of key votes at the conclusion of each legislative biennium. You can use this year's scorecard to find out how your representatives in the Vermont House and Senate voted on important public interest issues including — climate solutions, clean energy, voting rights, toxic chemical disclosure, health care and others.

### S.139 Health Care Reforms Public Interest Vote: YES

One of the very last bills to be passed by the Vermont legislature in 2015 included a number of important VPIRG backed reforms to improve our health care system – such as requiring insurers to give Vermonters the information they need to be able to shop for the best prices on health care services.

### S.73 - Rent-to-Own Public Interest Vote: YES

This law, passed in 2015, reins in the rent-to-own industry. It puts caps on how much rent-to-own merchants can mark up their products and guarantees that customers will not have to pay full price for used items. It also ensures consumers don't lose what they have invested in an item just because they miss a payment.

## H.4 – Banning Microbeads in Vermont

#### **Public Interest Vote: YES**

One of the first bills of substance to be voted on 2015, H.4 passed the House of Representatives 140-0 as legislators gave a resounding thumbs down to plastic microbeads in personal care products. A flurry of state action on the issue led the U.S. Congress to pass a bill banning microbeads that was signed into law by President Obama in December of 2015.

# S.29 – Election Day Voter Registration

#### **Public Interest Vote: YES**

This bill -- which passed the House 87-54 and the Senate 20-7 – will allow voters to register to vote on Election Day in Vermont, starting in 2017. In the dozen other states that have allowed voters to register on Election Day, voter turnout is a whopping 10% higher on average.

#### H.40 - Renewable Energy Standard Public Interest Vote: YES

One of the last bills to pass in the 2015 session was this critical renewable energy bill requiring Vermont utilities to provide their customers with renewable electricity, and ensuring at least 400 MW of new renewables will be built in Vermont over the next 15 years. The RES also requires electric utilities to help Vermonters cut their fossil fuel use for heating and transportation, which will help a projected 85,000 Vermont families invest in energy upgrades like weatherization, and save Vermonters an estimated \$390 million.

## H.40 – Amendment Eliminating Tier 3 Efficiency

#### **Public Interest Vote: NO**

Arguably the most important provision of the Renewable Energy Standard bill was "Tier 3" — the requirement that electric utilities help Vermonters cut their fossil fuel use and bills in the heating and transportation sectors. In a shortsighted move which would have increased Vermonters' energy costs by an estimated \$390 million, an attempt was made to strip this innovative program out of the bill.

### H.40 – Amendment Local/Abutter Clean Energy Virtual Veto Public Interest Vote: NO

In another attempt to slow clean energy, this provision would have given both the municipality a renewable project is located in and any "landowner whose property adjoins or is affected by the proposed plant" broad authority to stop renewable projects from being built.

### S.20 - Dental Therapists Public Interest Vote: YES

This bill allows dental therapists (mid-level dental providers that can perform more procedures than a hygienist, but fewer procedures than a dentist) to practice in Vermont. This will expand Vermont's dental workforce leading to reduced travel and wait times for Vermonters and giving more people in underserved communities the care they need. This bill passed the Senate in 2015 on an 18 – 8 vote, and the House in 2016 by a 109-32 margin.

### H. 861 - Treated Article Pesticides Public Interest Vote: YES

Seeds treated with neonicotinoid pesticides have been shown to be harmful to bees and other pollinators, but until now the state did not have the authority to regulate them. This legislation will give the state the ability to take necessary action to protect pollinators and our environment from treated article pesticides such as coated seeds.

### H.620 - Access to Contraceptives Public Interest Vote: YES

VPIRG worked closely with our partners at Planned Parenthood to pass legislation that will improve access to birth control for all Vermonters. Because of this law, Vermonters are now guaranteed access to contraceptives beyond what's covered in the Affordable Care Act, including vasectomies. Women will now be able to get up to a full year's prescription for oral contraceptives, and it will be easier to access long acting reversible contraceptives, which have been shown to dramatically reduce unplanned pregnancies.

### H.R. 13 – Divestment Public Interest Vote: YES

VPIRG and our allies successfully pushed for the House of Representatives to pass a resolution that urged State Treasurer Beth Pearce to carefully consider the case for divesting Vermont's pension funds from coal and ExxonMobil stocks. This led the Vermont Pension Investment Committee, which Treasurer Pearce vice-chairs, to form a subcommittee dedicated to studying divestment, in collaboration with divestment advocates – providing a possible path to fossil fuel divestment in the near future.

# H. 458 - Automatic Voter Registration

**Public Interest Vote: YES** 

Vermont became the 4th state in the nation to adopt an Automatic Voter Registration law, effective in 2017. This brings voter registration into the modern era by automatically registering Vermont citizens as voters when they apply for or renew their driver's license at the Department of Motor Vehicles. This bill had unanimous support in the Senate and just one vote against it in the House.

S.260 - Rules Suspension – Defending Clean Energy Public Interest Vote: YES

S.230 Override – Putting the Brakes on Clean Energy

**Public Interest Vote: NO** 

In the closing days of the 2016 session, the legislature passed S.230 — a bill designed to empower towns and regions to take a greater role, and have a greater say, in our clean energy transition — provided they write plans that advance Vermont's renewable energy and climate goals. Further analysis of S.230 showed that changes added at the last minute would have inadvertently put a one-year moratorium on wind. That led Gov. Shumlin to veto the bill and invite the legislature to send him a fixed version. Legislators who voted to suspend rules so the fixed bill could be taken up, voted to defend Vermont's clean energy progress. Legislators who voted to override the governor's veto, voted to put the brakes on renewable energy in Vermont.

# H.489 – Amendment – Keeping Our Unclaimed Nickels

#### **Public Interest Vote: YES**

Right now, the beverage industry keeps approximately \$2 million a year in "unclaimed nickels"—bottle deposits customers pay but do not redeem through their retailer. Seven of the ten states with Bottle Bills use these funds to support state and local programs. This amendment — which was defeated 10 to 19 — would have put those unclaimed nickels toward state efforts to improve our recycling system.

## S.139 – Amendment – Striking Language to Strengthen the Toxic Free Families Act

### **Public Interest Vote: NO**

In 2014 we helped enact an important law (Act 188) that's meant to protect kids from exposure to toxic chemicals hidden in children's products. VPIRG fought for language in S.139 that would have improved Act 188 by making it easier for state health officials to take action against toxic threats. This amendment ultimately removed that language from the final bill. The Senate vote was tied 15 to 15 when Lt. Gov. Phil Scott broke the tie by siding with the chemical industry.

### H.40 – Senate Amendment – Local Virtual Wind Veto

## S.R. 7 - Climate Change is Real Public Interest Vote: YES

In contrast with a majority of their counterparts in Washington, D.C. who deny global warming, all but five Vermont state senators sided with the most qualified scientific, military and economic minds alive today by approving a resolution to formally recognize the threat of global warming. By a 25-5 vote, the Senate approved this VPIRG-backed resolution.


# S.230 Amendment - Continuous Wind Monitoring

One of several attempts in the 2015-16 legislative biennium to stymy wind development, this amendment would have placed an unnecessary and costly 24/7 monitoring burden on every wind farm in Vermont for the life of each project. The amendment failed by a vote of 18-8.
